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1. SITUATION/BACKGROUND

- 1.1 A presentation to the former and current Vice Chair was given on 18th May 2021, outlining the background to Children's Rights, the achievements to date, progress by other Health Boards and a request for their support at the highest level of the organisation. Approval was given, leading to work being undertaken to develop the Children's Rights Charter. This is a pledge to service users that children's rights will be embedded across services within the Health Board.
- 1.2 The charter is based on the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, the Welsh Government's Participation Standards and the involvement from young people at a workshop in 2019.

2. SPECIFIC MATTERS FOR CONSIDERATION BY THIS MEETING (ASSESSMENT)

- 2.1 The first draft of the Charter has been developed and amended following presentation at the Growing Well Strategy Group on 7th October 2021 and feedback from the Equality and Inclusion Youth Forum in Cynon Linc, Aberdare on 15th February 2022. Additional feedback has been sought from Paediatric Nurses and Clinical Directors.
- 2.2 Based on the feedback received, a final version has been produced and is with the communications team for professional-style formatting and publication. Furthermore, a number of versions are in development to promote accessibility, including different language options and easy-read variations.
- 2.3 To engage children and young people in the various components of the Children's Rights Charter, local community groups will be encouraged to think about what it means to them and to develop art work for use in the final publication, e.g. by designing a Children's Rights logo.
- 2.4 An F2 medical student is developing elements of the charter into a practical framework to enable services and healthcare professionals to identify actions and improve on personal practice in order to meet the pledges set out in the Charter. Services and individuals who are able to demonstrate that they have embedded Children's Rights into working practices will be celebrated as advocates of Children's Rights.
- 2.5 A launch event (either virtual or in-person) will be planned in the summer 2022 to raise further awareness of the Charter.
- 2.6 A copy of the Children's Rights Charter for CTMUHB can be found in Appendix A of this paper.
- 2.7 A Charter is an important basic principle for all health boards to have on which to base their service developments including the new Wales Government transition guidance and CTMUHB admissions policy for 16 and 17 year olds. The implementation will: improve the care of Children

and Young People in CTMUHB; help their health and wellbeing; help address health inequalities within the region; increase participation; and help CTMUHB become an anchor organisation who embraces the views of those it cares for.

3. KEY RISKS/MATTERS FOR ESCALATION TO BOARD/COMMITTEE

- 3.1 Without a Children’s Rights charter in place CTMUHB will remain an outlier in Wales with all health boards now having these in place or under development.
- 3.2 In addition, as a public body, we have a statutory obligation to contribute to the realisation of Children’s Rights, therefore there is a potential risk that the Health Board may be in breach of this obligation if we do not demonstrate our commitment and progress in this area.
