15. What is the cost per day/night for admission to an adult NHS unit in the Health board?

16. What is the cost per day/night for an out of area placement for children in acute units, psychiatric intensive care units and eating disorder units?

We do not hold this specific data.

17. What are the locations for out of area placements for adults?

Within Wales and England.

18. What are the locations for out of area placements for children?

All appropriate placements would be within Wales and England.

19. What are the reasons for sending adults out of area?

Limited availability locally & specialist provision not provided by Local Health Boards.

20. What are the reasons for sending children out of area?

Children would require an out of area bed if they required a specialist placement that was not provided within the UHB.

21. Do the Health Board use parental consent to treat non-consenting children in a mental health unit?

Parental consent cannot be relied on to administer treatment to nonconsenting young people over 16 under any circumstances- capacious refusal of treatment by a 16 year old can only be overruled by the courts.

Similar to adults, incapacitated but non-refusing over 16s can be treated in their best interests- views of those with parental responsibility have to be taken into account whilst reaching a best interest decision. In reality, very few interventions undertaken with non-consenting patients would fall under the scope of parental responsibility hence these are done under detention, both for under and over 16s.

22. Are adult patients with Eating Disorders force-fed (via Nasogastric tube) in units in the Health Board or are they sent to specialist units?

Patients requiring Nasogastric tube are transferred from the Mental Health Unit to a general hospital ward for this procedure

23. Are child patients with Eating Disorders force-fed (via Nasogastric tube) in units in the Health Board or are they sent to specialist units?

We deliver re-feeding.
