Freedom of Information Request: Our Reference CTMUHB_249_23

You asked:

Under the Freedom of Information Act, I would like to request the following information from your organisation:

For all responses, please provide figures for the last three reported years:

1. What is the average length of stay in hospital for an individual who arrives at hospital due to a suspected acute (combined or otherwise) drug intoxication and then subsequently dies, were the drugs they had taken before they arrive at hospital were acknowledged in the cause of death?

The Health Board's information systems do not code the cause of death; such information could only be obtained by reference to the individual's death certificate, which the Health Board do not hold. Therefore, we are unable to provide this information.

- 2. What categories of emergency treatment, and in what proportions, are received in hospital by all those admitted for acute (combined and otherwise) drug intoxication?
- 3. What categories of emergency treatment, and in what proportions, are received in hospital by those admitted for acute (combined and otherwise) drug intoxication who are eventually discharged?
- 4. What categories of emergency treatment, and in what proportions, are received in hospital by those admitted for acute (combined and otherwise) drug intoxication which is eventually fatal?

We can confirm that the Health Board does not centrally record this information (Q2 – 4). Treatment for acute drug intoxication is not coded on our information system. Therefore, to provide you with this data would require a manual trawl through individual records. The Health Board estimates that the cost of retrieving and extracting this data would significantly exceed the 18 hours time and £450 cost limit set out within Section 12 of the Freedom of Information Act.

- 5. What is the day rate for the following treatment:
 - Acute drug intoxication non elective short stay
 - Acute drug intoxication non-elective long stay
 - Acute Combined drug intoxication non elective short stay
 - Acute combined drug intoxication non elective long stay

We can confirm that this information is not held to the level of detail requested.
