You asked:

I am writing to request the following data under the Freedom of Information Act.

If all the below questions cannot be answered within the appropriate time limit, please answer them in order until the limit is reached.

- 1. How many assessments for Children and Young People's Continuing Care were completed in each of the following financial years?
 - i) 2018/19
 - ii) 2019/20
 - iii) 2020/21
 - iv) 2021/22
 - v) 2022/23
 - vi) A combined total between 1 April 2018 and 31 March 2023

Children's Continuing Care is an outcome of a continuum assessment, completed in a variety of settings both in and outside CTMUHB. For CTM residents therefore, we do not keep records of all Continuing Care (CC) assessments completed; only those that resulted in a request for care that is not available through core service.

- 2. Of the completed assessments outlined in question 1, how many resulted in the individual being assessed as eligible for Children and Young People's Continuing Care? Please break down the figures by the following financial years.
- i) 2018/19
- ii) 2019/20
- iii) 2020/21
- iv) 2021/22
- v) 2022/23
- vi) A combined total between 1 April 2018 and 31 March 2023

Please see response to question 1. However, we can outline how many have resulted in a bespoke care package. A combined total between 1 April 2018 and 31 March 2023 = 10

A yearly breakdown has not been provided due to the low numbers involved. Where numbers are low we have considered that there is the potential for the individuals to be identified from the information provided, when considered with other information that may also be in the public domain.

In our view disclosure of these low figures would breach the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) and Data Protection Act 2018 and its disclosure would be contrary to the data protection principles and constitute as unfair and unlawful processing in regard to Articles 5, 6, and 9 of GDPR. We are therefore withholding this detail under Section 40(2) of the Freedom of Information Act 2000. This exemption is absolute and therefore there is no requirement to apply the public interest test.
